By the end of this course, students should be able to understand familiar words and everyday expressions and read and write simple sentences and statements in the present tense, including in basic interrogative and negative forms. They should be able to greet others and introduce themselves, and to ask and answer simple questions (such as personal details and likes/dislikes).

* The CEFR (Common European Framework of Reference for Languages) is used to describe achievements of learners of foreign languages across Europe, using six reference levels for grading an individual's language proficiency. A student can expect to reach the A1 level in French after 60 to 80 hours of instruction.
